

Argyle Recreation Physical Activity and Recreation Strategy 2025-2030



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BACKGROUND

The Municipality of The District of Argyle (MOA) is located in South West Nova Scotia. It is the oldest region still Acadian. The main economic factor of Argyle is the fishing industry, specifically lobster. As Argyle is home to LFA 34, which is the largest fishing area in the country. This means in terms of workplace physical activity levels, many residents are quite active (particularly males) as lobster fishing is a very physically extensive job. The lobster fishery also has many businesses that support the fishery such as fish processing plants, boat building shops, and bait manufacturers in our region that employs many people. However, while some traditional sectors are active, with an aging population, more sedentary, remote or computer-based work and recreation options, there remains much room for improvement in residents' physical activity levels, across the age span. The most recent data for Argyle indicates a need for movement opportunities such as walking, fitness classes, and strength training opportunities.

Given the population of youth under 19 years old (1,380). The Municipality of Argyle has two schools that are in Tri County Regional Centre of Education (TCRCE), which are Plymouth School (P-6) and Drumlin Heights Consolidated (P-12). There are also 4 schools that are in the CSAP- Ecole Belleville (P-6), Ecole Pubnico Ouest (P-6), Ecole Wedgeport (P-6) and Ecole Secondaire de Par En Bas (7-12). The schools are pivotal for enhancement of movement in our population as that is where children and youth are, and establishing active lifestyles at a young age will mean they will be more active as they age.

The Municipality of Argyle is unique due to its geography, with many communities spread along peninsulas throughout the region. This geography means that communities are often far apart and somewhat isolated from one another. This means the communities are close-knit and strongly support each other. Local volunteer groups play a key role in bringing people together and making great things happen across the municipality.

MOA does not house a large-scale recreation complex. However, MOA has taken a regional approach and work with the Town of Yarmouth, Municipality of Yarmouth to help fund the Mariners Centre, which is located on Starrs Rd in Yarmouth. For over 20 years, the Mariners Centre served as an integral part of Yarmouth County, as it houses two ice rinks. In 2024 it was announced that a new Campus Style Recreation Facility will be built in Yarmouth. The new Mariners Centre will have a modern aquatic center which will have a 6 lane, 25 metre pool, a leisure pool, a fitness center, multi purpose spaces, and an indoor walking track. The expansion will support programming and activities for youth and youth at risks, families, seniors and visitors alike.

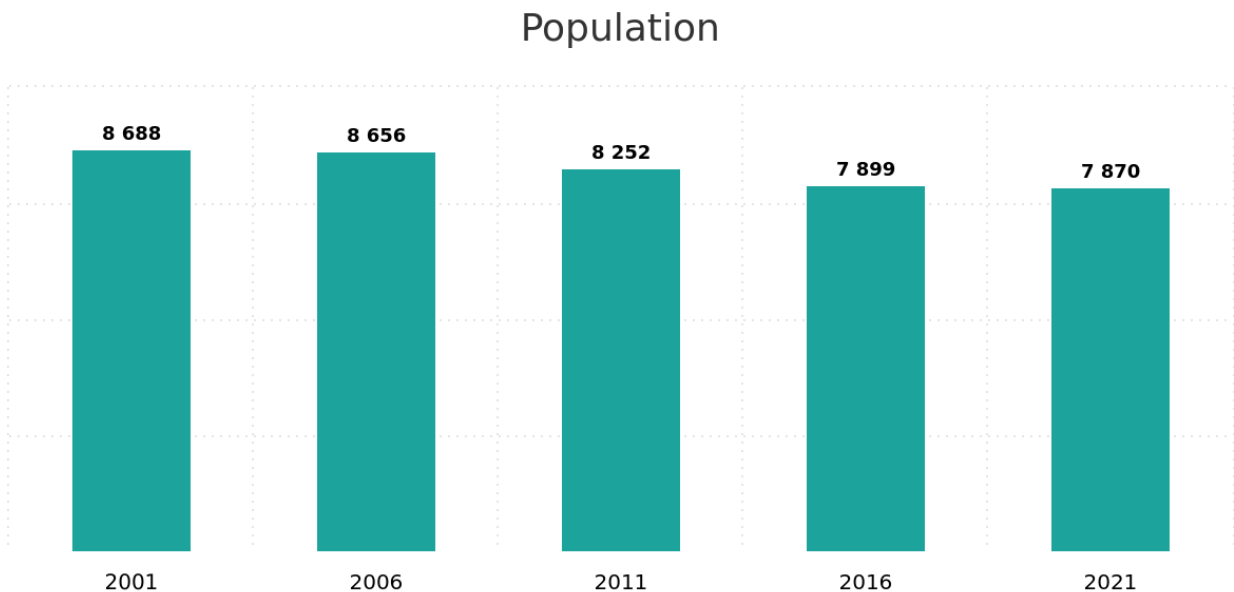

Population

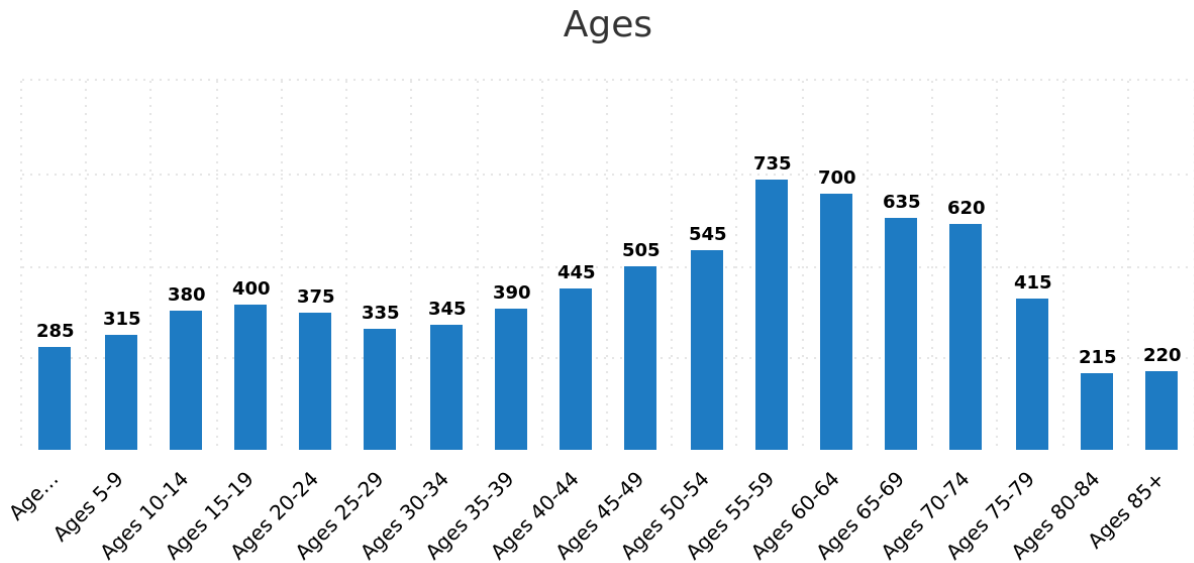

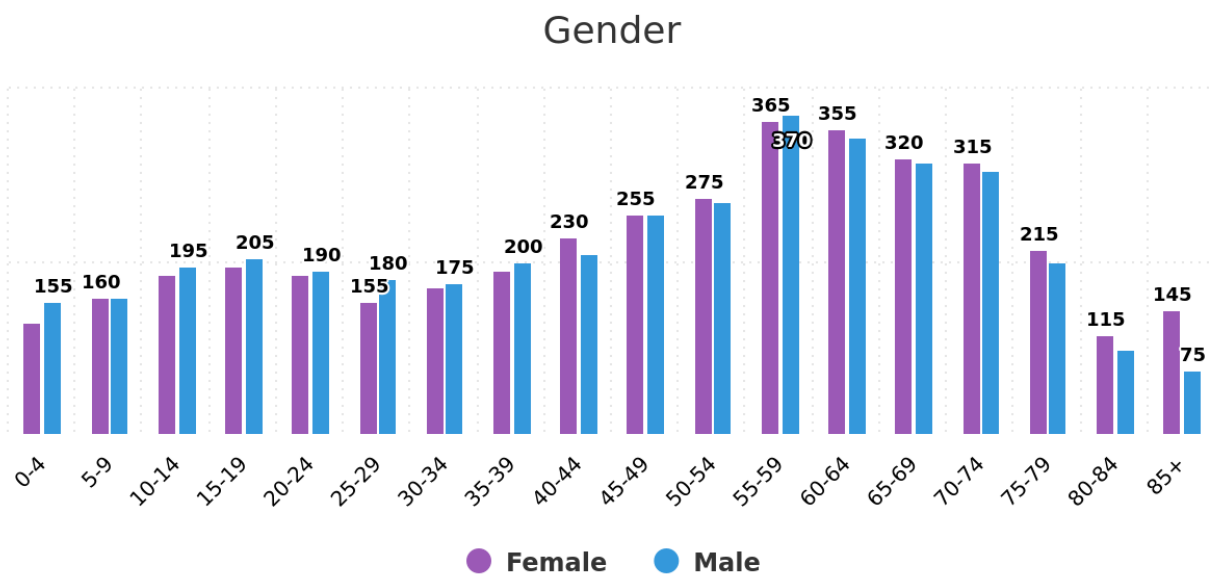

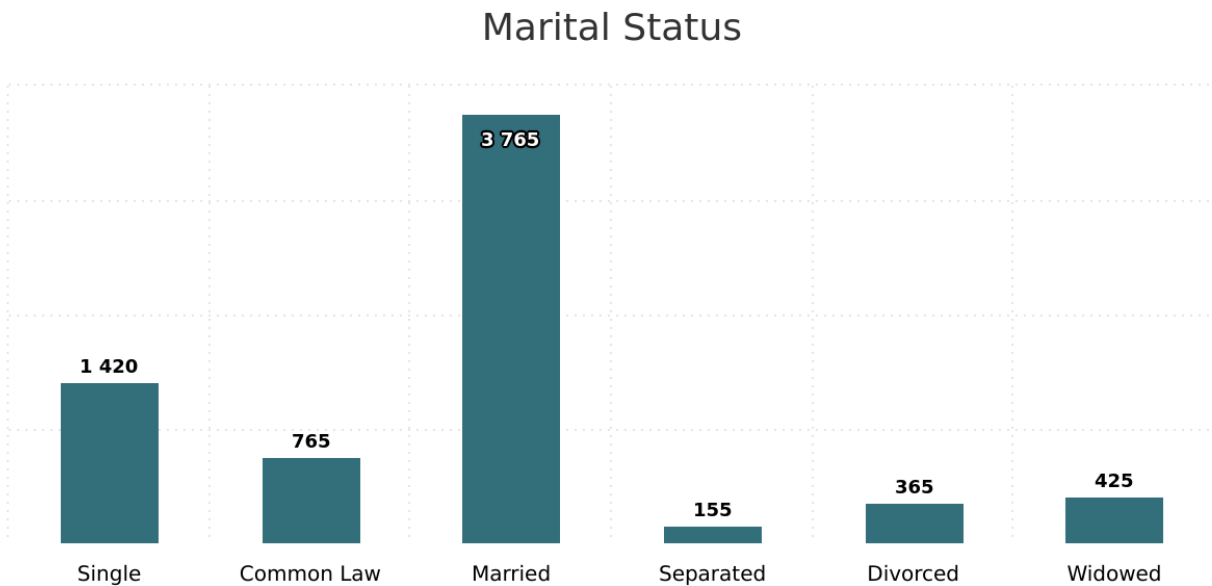

The marital status is another term for civil status, or person's current relationship with a partner.

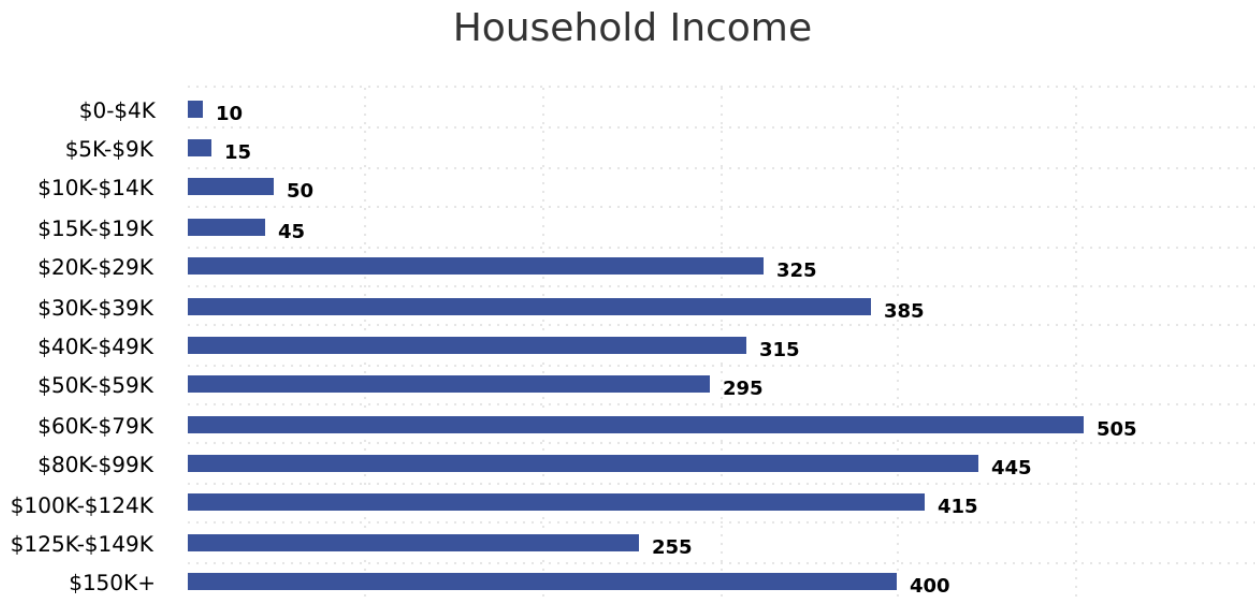

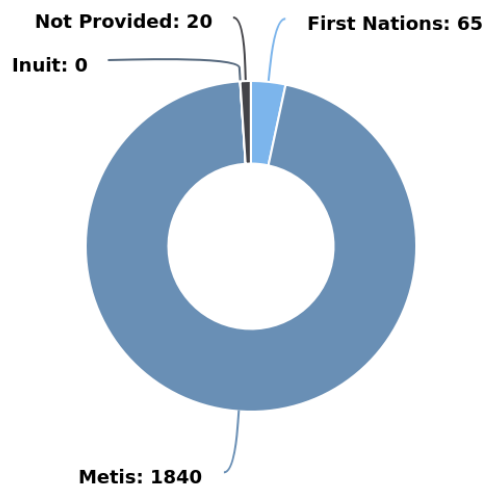

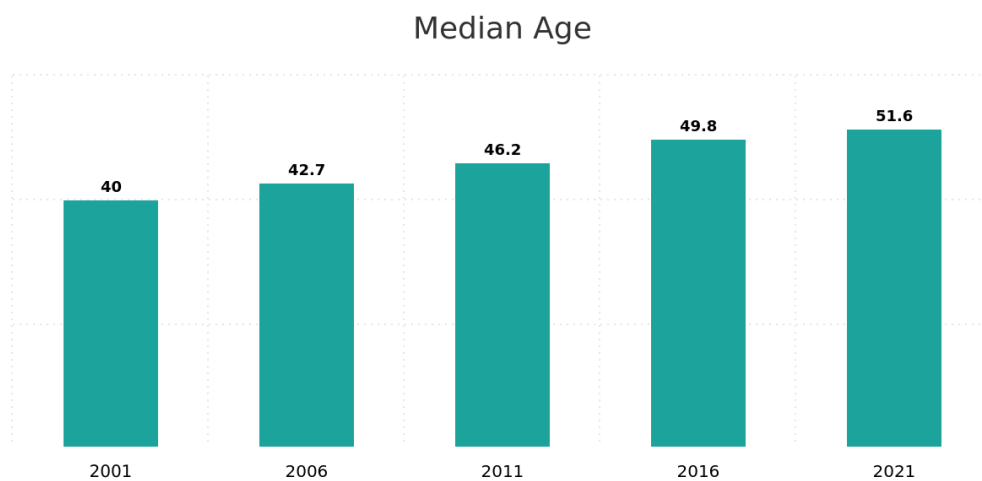
Indigenous Identification



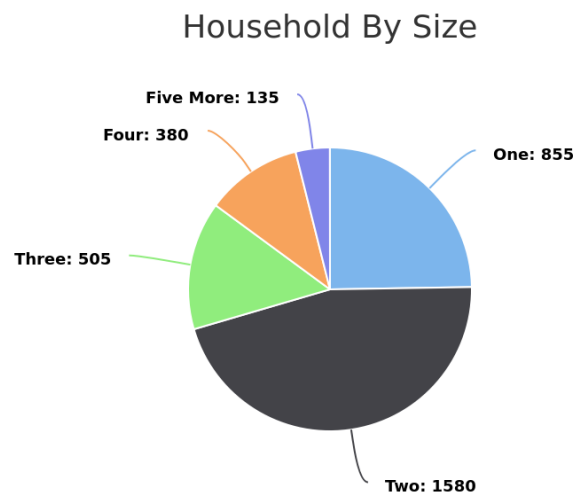
Median Age

GUIDING DOCUMENTS

There are many municipal and provincial documents that guide this strategy. Below is a quick summary of them:

Municipal:

- 1) The Argyle Anti Racism and Equity Plan:** The Anti-Racism and Equity Charter is based off the provincial Act Bill 90-Dismantling and Hate Act N0.90. The charter outlines 4 key priorities that will impact the way Argyle Recreation offers physical activity incentives and recreation services: Particularly priority 1) *Equitable Recreation Services* and 4) *Equitable Hiring Practices*. Argyle Recreation is also committed to the Nova Scotia Anti-Racism Charter, which is ensuring recreation spaces and services are welcoming and inclusive.
- 2) Municipality of Argyle Accessibility Plan:** The Accessibility plan highlights key recreational built environments that needs to be taken into consideration in the development of the strategy. Examples are the improvement and auditing existing sidewalks and trails in the Municipality.
- 3) Municipality of Argyle Active Transportation Strategy:** The active transportation strategy has ample action items that needs to be considered in the Physical Activity and Recreation Strategy. Large scale projects to increase movement are the Plymouth School-Newell Rd Project, Par-En-Bas Project, and many more.

Provincial:

- 1) Let's Get Moving Nova Scotia:** The LGM strategy is a provincial initiative that guides the MPAL role to implement physical activity initiative in the community. The focus is redefining movement, and focusing on addressing physical activity through healthcare, schools, workplaces, and community.
- 2) Nova Scotia Shared Trails Strategy:** The Provincial Shared Trails Strategy supports the usage and maintenance of trail system in the province. The Municipality of Argyle has multiple trails, as well as a popular rails trail. The 4 goals of this strategy are 1) Strengthen Alignment, Leadership and Collaboration of Trail Organizations. 2) Expand support for Trail Development and Management. 3) Improve the Planning of Trails. 4) Increase Trail Use
- 3) Nova Scotia Action For Health:** Provincial strategy that focuses on partnering with communities to empower Nova Scotians to improve health and wellness. The wellness fund is a supportive tool that may come in play for future initiatives.

- 4) **Nova Scotia Environmental Goals and Climate Change Reduction Act:** This legislature has Active Transportation goals, in which supports the Active Transportation Strategy.
- 5) **The Municipality of Argyle's Strategic Plan:** This plan was created in 2023-2028. The strategic priorities are economic growth, Community Representation, Safety, Modern and Efficient Services, and Welcoming Healthy and Inclusive Environments. These priorities need to be taken into consideration in the creation of this strategic plan.

PUBLIC CONSULTATION AND DATA GATHERING:

The Physical Activity Coordinator consulted the public from Spring 2025 until late December 2025. Their methodology was focus groups with youth and seniors, as well as asking questions to participants at recreational activities. MPAL targeted youth because traditionally this group is underheard and underrepresented in Municipal planning. MPAL targeted seniors because there is a high senior population in the Municipality. The Physical Activity Coordinator distributed surveys to seniors' groups in the area. This survey focused on the usage of the recreational facilities, and how often they walk. The Municipality of Argyle also participated in the Nova Insights online survey that was conducted by the province. Below are a summary of the main themes and methodology used to capture insight on the creation of the strategy.

YOUTH

MPAL set up focus groups with students from Drumlin Heights and Ecole Secondaire de Par En Bas. The goal of the focus groups was to speak to youth who were traditionally not physically active, to try and find out ways the Municipality can support its youth in improving our recreational services. Below are the results we found:

- **Drumlin Heights Focus Groups:** With the assistance of HPS school leads, and public health staff, MPAL was able to interview a fair number of students at Drumlin. They interviewed 3 groups of 10-15 students. Here are the main themes: Youth enjoy playing basketball and wanting to try more activities like Volleyball and biking. The youth are not aware and rarely use the activities and services that the Municipality of Argyle has to offer. Mostly due to the lack of knowledge youth have on Argyle Recreation. Therefore, there is a need for better communication amongst the Recreation Department and the school, so students are aware of our recreational services. Also, kids do not walk or bike to Drumlin due to the location of the school

(rural) and the unsafe roads of Argyle. Staff and students have mentioned they would like to walk around the school as there is already a “path” that has commenced, but work needs to be done to improve it for accessibility.

- **Ecole Secondaire de Par En Bas (PEB):** With the help of Ecole Plus staff, MPAL interview three group of 5 students ranging from grades 9-12. The main trends from Physical activity and recreation for students at PEB was they feel relatively safe walking from PEB-Orange Store/Tim Hortons. However, many expressed their concern for wintertime as the overpass and shoulders may not have a lot of room for students to walk. Many students in grades 10-12 expressed there are lack of recess activities as they do not have access to the gymnasium, and normally they go outside on the school parking lot to recreate. No student is allowed on the brand-new track and field at PEB due to lack of supervision. Another challenge students face is the lack of knowledge on recreation opportunities that Argyle can offer. For example, they were unaware of our equipment loan program but mentioned they would read flyers at the school if Argyle Rec placed them. The main activity they wish to see if boxing/ martial arts and other sport opportunities other than hockey (for boys) and volleyball (for girls).
- After speaking with both PEB and Drumlin Heights students, there is a need for further promotion of what Argyle Rec can offer to students. The main themes we saw from these groups were basketball, cycling, and more noncompetitive physical activity opportunities during school day.

ADULTS

Adults aged 30 and over Kayaking Clinic discussion: MPAL hosted 4 kayak clinics in the summer of 2025. The participants for the clinics were predominantly women over 45 years of age. The MPAL asked participants what are initiatives that would increase physical activity in their community: The common responses were: women only try it sessions such as pickleball and learn to run. Many of the participants were unaware of the inventory of equipment Argyle Rec has to loan.

Older adults over 55 years old: MPAL visited various senior groups across the Municipality. The first group was East Pubnico. In which they expressed many programming activities that they would like to see from our recreation department, such as group walks, chair yoga, and incorporating shuffleboard in their community space. Many of them access the rail trail, Pubnico Point Trail, and East Pubnico Bike Park occasionally. However, East Pubnico is quite far from many of the rec facilities in our Municipality. MPAL also distributed surveys to various senior groups. Such as East

Pubnico, West Pubnico, Sanit Anne Du Ruisseau, Quinan. MPAL reached to Wedgeport group but did not receive an answer. However, some members from the other group responded and their address was in Wedgeport. The main themes that came from each survey was the lack of usage on most recreation facilities; many residents do not walk in their community due to mobility issues or lack of quality infrastructure making it unsafe. Many requests for future recreational activities were social related events such as bus tours, walking groups, and playing cards.

- The overall summary for the adults is there is a need for women only activities, and low impact social events for the older seniors. Argyle Rec is also not able to promote our services to these people as well.

Nova Insight Survey: The Nova Insight Survey was in November-December 2025. The survey was about 20 minutes long, and there were 133 respondents. The key facilitators in an increased active lifestyle were self motivation, having someone to partake in activities with, time management, weather, indoor spaces, and having more information on upcoming activities. The biggest motivators for an increased use of walking were sidewalk maintenance, indoor spaces, safer environments, trails and wider sidewalks. The biggest motivators for increased cycling included bicycle lanes, better road conditions, off road paths, and reduced traffic speed.

4. Offer quality initiatives that increase physical activity

1. Increase awareness of recreation opportunities in Argyle

- Collaborate with Schools Plus to support youth in sport and recreation (ongoing)
- Collaborate with Western Region Enterprise Network to allow newcomers to be aware of recreation opportunities in Argyle (2025-2026)

4. Offer quality initiatives that increase physical activity

4.1. Improve the equipment loan program in Argyle

4.3. Continue providing summer day camp programs in the Municipality of Argyle

- offer day camps at Ecole Pubnico Ouest, Ecole Belleville, and Plymouth School (ongoing)
- Ensure the summer day camps are as low cost as possible (ongoing)
- Continue hiring an extra inclusion staff, and one spare staff (ongoing)
- Evaluate whether Plymouth Day Camp should be moved to Ecole Wedgeport (2028-2029)
- Focus on increasing participation at Plymouth through promotion at the school (2026-2027)

4.4 Continue supporting quality equipment improvements at all parks in the Municipality

- Continue supporting the playbox initiative at Parc Des Jeunes, East Pubnico Bike Park, and Kemptville Park. Explore if other open spaces such as Mariners Centre Canadian Tire Park would benefit from a playbox. (2026-2027)
- Improve the Kemptville Parks pathway that leads to Beaverhouse Lake (2029-2030)
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4.5. Offer a variety of low cost or free try it activities targeted for women 45+

- pickleball, volleyball, kayak, golfing, softball lacrosse, running, SUP, swimming)
- Partner with Senior Safety Coordinator to offer quality recreation programs for our aging population (ongoing)
- Offer barbecue events at local parks to increase small bouts of movement (ongoing)
- partner with Senior Safety Coordinator to offer Christmas related activities such as stocking (ongoing)
- Provide guided walks and hikes around trails (ongoing)
- Visit community centres and offer low barrier activities for members (ongoing)
- Explore the possibility of hosting a Municipality of Argyle Senior Games (2027-2028)

4.5 offer workplace wellness initiatives to increase movement in community

- Offer initiatives that increase small bouts of movement for office staff (ongoing)
- Reach out to local businesses in the Tuskent area about noon time walks (ongoing)
- Explore the option of having a workplace wellness network in the chamber of commerce to enhance wellness County wide. (2028-2029)
